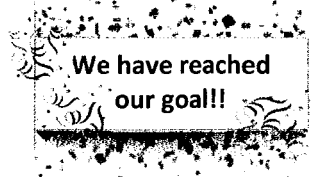

YEAR OF MERCY

PUTTING THE WORKS OF MERCY INTO PRACTICE

Visit those in Prison, Comfort the Sick



Visiting those in prison certainly does not mean being "soft on crime." With some violent criminals, society has little choice but to "lock them up and throw away the key."

Throw away the key, indeed - but not the *person*. Punishment deters and quarantines and gives the criminal the opportunity to do penance, but friendship and prayer have the capacity to reform and to heal. A true work of mercy is done by Christians who befriend those in correctional institutions in the name of Jesus Christ, perhaps through prison outreach ministries, thereby affirming their human dignity as persons made in God's image. Needy persons on our "doorstep" that we are not supposed to "step over" (i.e., neglect; see Lk 16.19-20) can sometimes be those in the prison nearby.

The sixth corporal work of mercy is to comfort the sick. In part, to "comfort the sick" means, first of all, to comfort them with something they urgently need: namely, proper medical assistance.

Of course, there are some people who are "sick" not from physical illness but from social isolation. One thinks especially of the elderly in our communities who, whether at home or in long-term care facilities, live in geographical isolation from their loved ones. "Visiting the sick" in our world can mean reaching out to the friendless in our local nursing homes: those who are "sick at heart" from being lonely and forgotten and who are regularly deprived of the basic human need called "friendship." The socially isolated elderly are usually not far away. They often live just around the corner from us, or they members of our own parish. Most of all, do not forget that some of them may even be members of your own family, relatives too much overlooked and too often forgotten.

Visiting the housebound elderly and the chronically and terminally ill is no easy task. Trying to do it on a regular basis can take us right out of our "comfort zones" because it confronts us with real human lives for which, in earthly terms, there seems to be so little hope. Such people often live in squalor and with the constant stench of sickness or the wince of chronic pain. But our mere presence, as someone willing to be a friend and a listening ear, can mean much more to them than we can imagine, and along the way they will be giving a precious gift to us as well: the gift of growth in the virtue of compassion.



A Warm Welcome to the Syrian

Raymond,

Refugee Families!

The two refugee families sponsored jointly by St. Patrick's Church and Holy Family Parish arrived in Medicine Hat on Friday, January 22nd!

Syria is a lot smaller than Canada. Raymond says it would take about 6 hours to drive across the whole country. Both families have lived in Damascus, which is the capital of Syria home to about 5 million people.

Have they seen snow before?!

The weather in Damascus follows seasons similar to ours. April to May is spring and summer runs to September. There is snow in Syria on the mountains and it can get to about -6°C at night. In summer it is around 37 °C. They don't have snow storms, but they have sand storms. Yvonne recalled one time a "tornado of sand" like a blizzard blew from Saudi Arabia and through the city. People had to cover their faces when going outside.

Having to Leave Syria

Wael remembers in 2011 rebel action started in parts of Damascus. There were break-ins and bombings, but his family "kept moving to the safe side". In 2015 there was no "safe side" and they felt their lives were in danger so they went to Lebanon to stay with friends. In Damascus there was rarely electricity or water and it was difficult to live a normal life.

Raymond and Yvonne also moved to Lebanon to stay with friends, but life in Lebanon was not easy. Everything there is very expensive and the people are not always nice to Syrians that come. Syrians are not allowed to hold jobs in Lebanon. In some places they are even forbidden to walk on the street. They must leave every month and return briefly to Syria to maintain the proper government paperwork.

Wael described the situation in Syria and the Middle East as "Chaos in the absolute sense of the word". There is conflict of powers between militia, government forces, ISIS, and others too complicated for anyone to control. The church there is trying to help, but there are a lot of Christians persecuted and killed.

Raymond, Yvonne, Mary, and Mirella

Raymond and his family are from Damascus. They went to live in Lebanon with friends in 2015 before starting the process to come to Canada. She is now here with her sister, Yvonne, and her family.



Mary

Mary is 9 years old and very happy to be here. She learned French in school in Syria and loves school very much. Her favorite animal is a horse and she likes basketball and piano. She would like to learn to ride a bike.

Her favorite colour is orange.

Mirella

Mirella, Mary's younger sister is 4 and a half years old. On March 12th she turns five! Her favorite food is chocolate and chips. Her favorite colour is green and she likes bowling.



Yvonne

Yvonne studied English in school and studied French Literature for 4 years at the University of Damascus. Later, she worked as an executive secretary for I.T.S. (International Trading Syria). After the company pulled out of Syria she was able to raise Mirella who was just born. She likes to play sports and praises God for being happy and safe.



Raymond

Raymond enjoys relaxing, listening to music, and reading.

(Yvonne says he is always reading). He hopes

to finish his almost completed Masters of Business Administration from Heriot-Watt University: Edinburgh Business School, which he had to postpone when the U.K. embassy pulled out of Syria. When in Syria he worked for a private bank for 12 years and was manager of a retail department.

Wael, Mirna, Adeeb, and Elena

Wael would describe his family as being from the countryside of Syria. But they moved to the city, Damascus, to get jobs. Mirna and Wael worked in Saudi Arabia for a while, but then returned to Damascus to raise Elena.



Elena

Elena is 9 years old and loves spending time with her cousin, Mary. She likes to draw and is a fan of the movie "Frozen". Her favorite animal is a rabbit and she will eat ice-cream anytime. She studied

Arabic, English, and French at her private school named after John the Baptist in Damascus.

Adeeb

Adeeb's name means "polite and sophisticated" like a philosopher or a biographer. He likes to play Lego and has a talent for cutting paper into shapes and designs.



Mirna

In Syria, Mirna worked as a secretary in a hotel for the engineering department. She quit her work at the hotel in 2012 because of frequent

bombings in that area and focused her attention on sewing, design work, and knitting. She enjoys sports. At the pool you can find her on the side getting a tan, because she is scared of water. She loves to cook, but is not good at baking (her sister Yvonne is the baker!).



Wael

Wael would describe himself as a "Master" in sales and watch "science". He has lots of experience as a senior sales specialist for Cartier of Saks Fifth Avenue in Saudi Arabia, for DeBeers in Dubai, and for Mario Group. When he is not working he enjoys surfing the net, reading (a lot), and biking. He likes to learn about history. One of the first questions he asked when arriving here was "Where does the name Medicine Hat come from?"

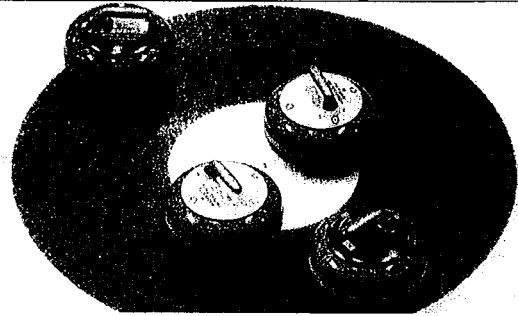

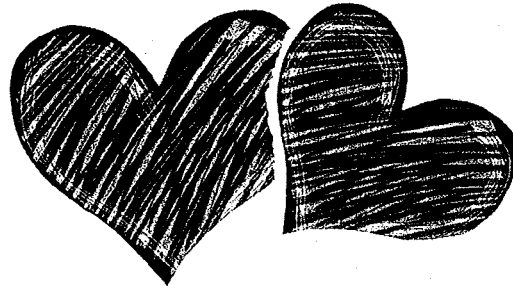

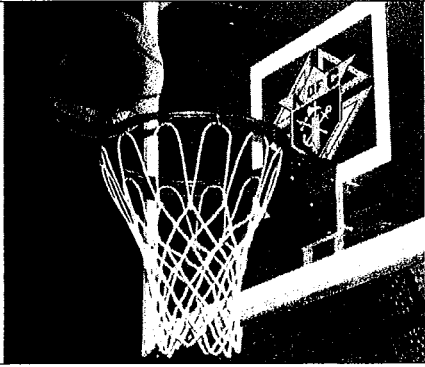

The Vision of Father McGivney

Led by the quiet, unassuming curate of St. Mary's Parish in New Haven, Conn., a small group of men established the Knights of Columbus in the church basement early in the spring of 1882. The priest, Father Michael J. McGivney, saw clearly that both Catholics and the Church faced serious problems in the last half of the nineteenth century such as anti-Catholicism and ethnic prejudice; under-employment; lack of social standing and early loss of the breadwinner.

To resolve those problems Father McGivney conceived the idea of an organization of Catholic men who would band together:

- To aid one another in times of sickness or death, by means of a simple insurance plan, so that their wives and children would not face abject poverty.
- To strengthen themselves and each other in the Faith.
- To strengthen families and family life.
- To be a strong pillar of support for their priests and bishops.
- To be of service to Church and community by coming to the aid of those most in need in society.

They called themselves Knights of Columbus – Knights to emphasize chivalry's ideals of charity and support for Church and state, and Columbus as a reminder that Catholics had been the backbone and bulwark of America's growth and greatness from the very beginning.

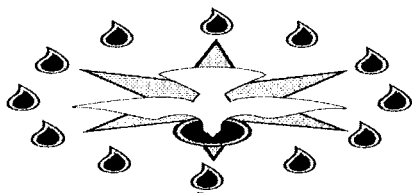
